5 Year Review of Nunavut Education Act

- When the Nunavut Education Act was enacted in 2009, there was a provision in the Act that it would be reviewed in 5 years.
- The Nunavut Legislature's <u>Special Committee to Review the</u> <u>Education Act</u> will begin this review soon.
- DEAs will be asked to provide their input to this review process.



What is the Focus of the Review?

- The Chairperson of the Special Committee to Review the Education Act (George Hickes) has said the review of the Education Act will include an examination of:
 - 1. the administration and implementation of the Act.
 - 2. the effectiveness of its provisions.
 - 3. the achievement of its objectives...and
 - 4. it may include recommendations for changes" to the legislation.



The New Education Act: What Was it Intended to Do for DEAs?

Build a new partnership between DEAs and Government.

Empower DEAs with new authority to impact the quality of education in their communities.



What have we learned about the new Education Act in the last 5 years?



- The new Nunavut Education Act was intended to increase the level of partnership between Government by transferring more authority to DEAs.
- This partnership between DEAs (most) and Government, and DEAs and the Coalition has not made much progress.
- DEAs have been poorly informed about their authority, and <u>how to use</u> their authority to <u>impact education</u> in their community.

What have we learned about the new Education Act in the last 5 years?



- Since the introduction of the new Education Act, some DEAs have expressed concern about the number of new responsibilities that DEAs are handling, without a budget increase.
- In 2010 the Coalition undertook a study on DEA operations to get a better understanding of these pressures.



What did We Learn from the Coalition Study on DEA Budgets?



- Since 2008 there has been a 43% increase in DEA responsibilities.
- DEAs have responsibility for 49 different tasks. 21 of these tasks were added in the new Act.
- DEAs responsibilities has increased without an increase in budget or sufficient levels of training and development.
- Because of their new responsibilities, DEAs are focused on administration, instead of improving the quality of education in their communities.
- Many DEAs don't have (qualified) full-time staff to deliver their new responsibilities.



Office by the Auditor General (OAG) Audited the Department of Education in 2013

 The OAG looked at: attendance, inclusive education, bilingual education, assessment, parental involvement and curriculum in the school system.

 The OAG report concluded that the Department of Education has not adequately managed most aspects of the implementation of the Education Act.



The Special Committee to Review the Education Act Needs to Hear from DEAs about the Quality of Education in Your Community.

- 3. The Coalition of Nunavut DEAs will be <u>surveying</u> all DEAs with the results being shared with the Standing Committee. (Will discuss this shortly)
- 4. DEAs can prepare their own submissions.
- 5. Share your issues with your MLA.
